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Boundary Disputes A boundary dispute is a dispute that arises between owners or occupiers of neighbouring properties.

Sometimes, but not always a boundary dispute will arise when one party constructs a fence, wall or building in a position which highlights that the two neighbours have different views as to where the boundary lies. Boundary

A boundary between your property and your neighbours (or indeed council and common land) is usually set out in the earliest conveyance deed or transfer deed that refers to the land. Problems Boundary disputes occur when two people both believe they have the right to a piece of land.

They often begin when one person puts up a fence or wall on land which another person thought belonged to them. Property

boundary disputes - DAS Law A I f the boundary ownership is not clear on any plan or description, the law makes various assumptions: 1 If it's a fence, then usually the back of the fence faces the owner. The 'back' is the side with the posts. 2 If it's a hedge and ditch, then these belong to the land on the hedge side - ie the far side of the ditch is the boundary.
